



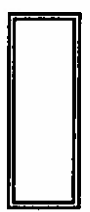

Fenestration is flat-topped, six-over-six, and nine-over-six, with jack arch stone lintels. Interior gable-end chimneys. slightly smaller addition has been built on the west gable end.

Statement of Significance	
The area that would become Kearneysville was first settled in the 1750s, when Thomas, Lord Fairfax, sold land to Nicholas Lemen. The settlement was named for Uriah and James Kearney, Sr, who settled shortly thereafter. The greatest growth impetus for the settlement occurred in the 1830s with the arrival of the B & O Railroad, after which time stores, residences, and churches were built here. This was owned by Uriah Kearney and appears to meet National Register Criterion C for <i>architecture</i> , although an evaluation of the integrity of the interior would be required to confirm this determination. In 1876 it was acquired by Daniel Webster Border.
