

This is an imposing early log and wood frame house with a laterally-oriented gable roof penetrated by gabled dormers; the roof extends beyond the plane of the building and shields a double gallery porch which extends across the entirety of the facade. "Hopewell" was erected by William Little who acquired the property in the 1760s. He operated go Shenandoah River and in 1786 was a Trustee as Charles Town was being organized. He also served as Little tied c. 1803 and his son and namesake retained ownership until 1827 when the property was Newcomer. Hite named the house after the home owned by his ancestors in Leetown.
