The cemetery contains the remains of members of the Johnson family and others who lived in the settlement over the decades. Johnsontown was established by free African Americans who were brought to Jefferson County as slaves in the 1720s by German Quakers homesteading with Joist Hite but were immediately released upon their arrival. They went on to be servants for Hite and his companions and founded Johnsontown, the only free African-American community in Virginia prior to the Civil War. The settlement grew from a 14-acre grant given to George W. Johnson and his wife, Betsy, from Thomas Hite. A school operated in the village from 1876-1933 and the Zion Baptist Church was erected in 1898 immediately west of the cemetery. Johnsontown appears eligible for the National Register as a historic district under Criterion A for its association with *ethnic heritage* and this site would be a contributing element in such a district; it may also meet Criterion Consideration D for cemeteries.
