The Jefferson County Historic Landmarks Commission (JCHLC) is pleased to announce it has received a \$5,000 grant from the Eastern West Virginia Community Foundation—Helen Parker Willard Jefferson County Historic Cemetery Grants. These funds will support the Coyle Cemetery Stone Wall Rehabilitation project.

The Coyle Family Cemetery is located at 40 Poor Farm Road, Kearneysville, WV. Further north on Poor Farm Road is the Jefferson County Poor House, also known as Snow Hill, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. Over the years, groundhogs have caused extensive damage to the stone wall that surrounds the Coyle Cemetery, blocking any practical access to the site. With help from the Helen Parker Willard Fund, which emphasizes the preservation of Civil War history, the JCHLC will be able to finish repairs to the stone wall and improve access to this historic site. This project is intended to demonstrate Jefferson County's commitment to preservation of County owned historic resources.

The Coyle cemetery is an excellent example of an early 19th century family cemetery with thirty graves identified thus far. The cemetery contains at least one grave of a Civil War veteran, Confederate Sgt. Joseph C. Coyle of the 12th Virginia Cavalry, who was killed at Bunker Hill, WV on March 27, 1864. Another burial plot is that of Major Joseph O. Coyle. The date of birth and death on his headstone indicates he could also have served in the Mexican War, Civil War or both. Three graves have been determined to be burial sites for slaves of the Coyle family.

The JCHLC is a branch of the Jefferson County government and operates under authority granted to landmarks commissions by the West Virginia legislature. The JCHLC's mission is to preserve historic sites, structures, and rural landscapes in the unincorporated areas of Jefferson County and to educate the public about the county's heritage.
