The meeting was concerned with the status of structures visited by the Commission as to which had been awarded plaques and which were slated to receive plaques.

Those accorded plaques to date are:

- White House

Those not having received plaques but have been selected to receive this honor are:

- Locust Ridge
- Headspring
- Darke Slave Quarters
- Falling Spring (at Morgan's Spring)

Those structures or sites meriting plaques but do to location and/or physical nature of site or feature cannot conveniently have a plaque affixed are as follows:

- Peter Burr House
- Trinity Chapel
- The George Washington Masonic Cave
- The Manor House
- General Darke's Grave

Those meriting plaques but having questionable Revolutionary period association or existence are:

- Eastwood
- Rock Hall
- The Cottage
- The Crawford Place
